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1. 10th India-Thailand Defence Dialogue (2026)

Why in the news?

The 10th India-Thailand Defence Dialogue was held in Bangkok on 16 June 2026 to review bilateral defence cooperation and discuss regional and global security issues.

Why in the news?

The US and Iran have reached an agreement based on a fourteen-point plan that will soon be signed at Geneva. As per the leaked document, this agreement ensures sanctions relief and economic assistance from the US side in return for the guarantee that Iran does not develop any nuclear weapons.

Background

- Relations between the U.S. and Iran have remained strained since the 1979 Iranian Revolution.
- The Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action (JCPOA) of 2015 limited Iran's nuclear activities in return for sanctions relief.
- In 2018, the U.S. withdrew from the JCPOA and reimposed sanctions, leading Iran to gradually expand uranium enrichment.
- In 2026, military tensions escalated into a 40-day conflict, followed by a ceasefire on 8 April 2026.

Conclusion

Health surveys are valuable only when they trigger timely corrective action. Statistics should function like an X-ray, revealing hidden weaknesses and guiding treatment. India has built an extensive data collection ecosystem, but the true challenge lies in converting information into accountability, programme reform and budgetary priorities. More than additional data, India requires institutional mechanisms that translate evidence into action.

5. Modi Meets Trump, Raises Safety of Indian Sailors

Why in the News?

- Prime Minister Narendra Modi met U.S. President Donald Trump on the sidelines of the G7 Summit at Evian, France.
- PM Modi raised concerns regarding the safety of Indian seafarers following the deaths of three Indian sailors in a U.S. strike near the Strait of Hormuz.
